
## FUITOUG h& FUITCE UPDATE from the Bruners • MAY 2015



n the last letter we sent by mail (Sept. 2014), we had recently arrived back in the U.S. and were settling in Texas for our year of home assignment. As we are now preparing to return to Papua New Guinea (PNG) in July, it is encouraging to look back over the year and see how God has provided for us in so many ways. In this letter we want to give you a brief look at what has been happening with each of us this past year and share about some changes coming our way when we return to PNG.

**OHN:** I had missed a number of family gettogethers while we were overseas so I have really enjoyed the times I have spent with family members this past year. I also enjoyed running, playing golf and tennis, and being a spectator at our boys numerous sporting events. I have continued to work on the Fataleka translation and in March I spent three weeks in the Solomon Islands working with the team. We were able to check six books and the Fataleka New Testament is now about 80% complete and the target date for completion is 2017.





RENA: After five years overseas of cooking everything from scratch, this year has been a nice break for her in that regard. She hasn't spent a whole lot of time in the kitchen. She's also enjoyed hanging out with family members and old friends, watching movies and shows that aren't available overseas, watching the boys play the games they love, and frequenting the public library. Since living in a state of transition isn't something she finds easy, this year of rest has been just what she's needed.

After we returned to the States I heard that The Seed Company was hoping to find an experienced consultant who could oversee these interns. Because it lines up well with my background and interests, I decided to accept the position when it was offered to me. I am looking forward to being able to invest my time in training and mentoring these interns so that they can be successful in the work they do in various Bible translation projects. In addition to overseeing these internships I will continue to do consultant checking for both the Fataleka translation project in Solomon Islands and other projects in PNG. Brena plans to continue working part time with the member care department – doing teas for ladies who work in villages and helping with community coffee nights – and keeping us boys well fed.

Even though we will be working with The Seed Company we are still officially with Wycliffe and things stay pretty much the same.
